As a resident of this community, I have significant concerns regarding the potential negative impacts this facility may have on our neighborhood's health, safety, and overall quality of life.

Firstly, hot dip galvanizing involves the use of various chemicals and the emission of pollutants, which could pose **serious health risks** to residents, especially children and the elderly.
