

SEPA ENVIRONMENTAL CHECKLIST

Yes, four wetlands are identified onsite (A,B,C,D). Wetlands A and B are determined not to be waters of the U.S. Wetlands C and D discharge to the roadside ditch on State Highway 9 crosses under the highway before entering an unnamed fish habitat stream that eventually flows into Portage Creek

Yes, Wetlands A and B will be developed and mitigated for offsite. Proposed development will be located within 200 ft of Wetlands C and D.
